Summarize this person's or group's stance on the bill (list two to three main points of the argument):

- FDR supports the Lend-Lease Bill.

Western Hemisphere next.

- Our ability to keep out of war depends on the success of the British.
- Defend Britain now, and there is less chance the United States will get involved in the war.
- It is America's role to be "the great arsenal of democracy."

What evidence (if any) does your individual or group provide to support the argument?

- The Nazis have proclaimed time and time again that all other races are their inferiors and therefore subject to their orders, meaning that they would in fact want to conquer the Western Hemisphere.
- The British aren't asking us to fight, just to help send the implements of war.
